# Water For Cameroon - Annual Report 2015

### **Board membership:**

John Young joined the Board in November.

## **Funding:**

80% of the income of  $\[ \in \]$ 29,561 in the year came from gifts and offerings and 20% from local fund-raising activities (ladies mini-marathon, a car boot sale and a BBQ). Expenditure was  $\[ \in \]$ 25,059, resulting in an increase in funds in hands of  $\[ \in \]$ 4502.

# Visits during year:

The project manager visited Cameroon three times during the year, visiting various communities and following up on the work that takes place throughout the year.

- March 21<sup>st</sup> to April 28<sup>th</sup>...... Total of 38 days
- August 1<sup>st</sup> to August 22<sup>nd</sup>...... Total of 20 days
- November 30<sup>th</sup> to December 21<sup>st</sup>...... Total of 22 days

### **Volunteers:**

Experienced development practitioners Jerry Ohz and Don Williams also visited several times during 2015. They conducted training on the use of Drip Irrigation for family gardens.

## **Additional Cameroonian partners:**

Water for Cameroon continues to seek out like-minded Cameroonian NGO's to partner with. Discussions were commenced in 2015 with Rotary Canada and with the Cameroon Association for Bible Translation & Literacy (CABTAL) with regard to WFC partnering with them on specific projects they are working on.

## Well construction:

A total of seven wells were constructed in 2015 including a narrow bore well trial in the quarter of Missi. It was decided not to use this type again. A rope and bucket well was constructed in the quarter of Bechu.

## **Pump fitting:**

Afridev pumps were fitted to three existing wells which had been using a rope and bucket system to retrieve water from the wells.

### **Bio Sand Filters:**

Filters were installed in a training centre in Bamenda and also in a number of rural homes.

The filters are constructed and installed by Cameroonians who have been trained by Water for Cameroon.

#### **Health Promotion:**

The Canadian organisation Centre for Affordable Water and Sanitation Technology (CAWST) conducted a five day training workshop for Health promoters. More than twenty participants took part in the workshop. Many were from other NGO's and valued the opportunity to receive high level training.
